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BACKGROUND

Uganda Census report 2016:

- Youngest population in the world
- 11.3% adolescent girls
- 9.7% young women
- Contraceptive use among adolescent is 11%
- 34% unmet for family planning

HIV prevalence among AGYW

- **4.9%** for the (15-19 yrs)
- **7.1%** for 20-24 yrs
- Low FP use
- Early sex debut exposes them to the risk of HIV and unplanned pregnancy


Role of CHC in DREAMS

CHC is a 5 year, USG mechanism that supports GOU and USG IPs to design and implement quality HC Interventions that contribute; to reduction in HIV infections, total fertility, maternal and child mortality, malnutrition, malaria and tuberculosis


- DREAMS is a global initiative implemented in 10 countries. The program is in 10 districts in 3 regions-Central & Northern
- **Target**: 10-24
- Conducted by a consortium of IPs
- Interventions empower AGYWs and reduce their risk, mobilize communities for norm change & strengthen families to support & protect AGYWs


- Provided technical support to spearhead SBCC Interventions
- Conducted participatory development of HC materials and tools
- Strengthened the capacity of peer champions in use of HC materials while engaging peers.
- Support districts &IPs to conduct targeted demand creation activities
- Integration of messages WASH, nutrition, malaria, tuberculosis and other RH services
- Supported IPs to reproduce and disseminate materials.




Levels of comprehensive HIV knowledge among AGYW 2015 – 2017







