I greet you all in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

This is dangerous because a purposeless life is vulnerable to disruptions and destruction. Ask yourself today, as a graduate of Uganda Christian University, have you defined what you are going to do in life. It has often been said, that a purposeless life is not worth living. I therefore implore you to work out your life goals and purpose to achieve them.

Life is about growth. So it is my prayer that you increase in your knowledge and skills. Explore the opportunities of how you can grow your profession. Do not be satisfied with the status quo because the world you are moving into is very competitive and you need to give yourself a comparative advantage, through further training.

As the University Council we commend the University Management, led by the Vice Chancellor for all the achievements attained through the challenging COVID-19 period. UCU has remained a leader in Higher Education in this Country. Many Universities have come to bench mark on how UCU has been able to execute its business continuity plan. However, you should also be aware that you will be faced with all kinds of advice and you will also be required to make many choices both in your personal and professional lives. The Psalmist summarises for us as to what we should do, in Psalm 1. It reads

"Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful.

But his delight is in the law of the LORD; and in his law doth he meditate day and night.

And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.

The ungodly are not so: but are like the chaff which the wind driveth away.

Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous.

For the LORD knoweth the way of the righteous: but the way of the ungodly shall perish".

The Psalmist is cautioning us, not to walk in the counsel of the ungodly, but we should delight in the law of the Lord. For the counsel of the wicked will only lead us to destruction.

Verse 3 reveals the fruits of seeking Godly counsel. It reads: "And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper".

I commend to you Psalm 1 as you go out. Make it your daily reference.

I pray for God's blessing upon your lives, upon your future and upon your families. To God be the Glory.
